The Commission on Collegiate Education in Nursing (CCNE) visited JCHS September 24-26, 2007 to review our Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and the Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) programs. CCNE is the organization that accredits nursing programs at baccalaureate and higher levels of education. The visit went well and we received full accreditation for 8 years!

JCHS, STTI and Carilion Clinic sponsored an exciting educational event November 28, 2007. Josepha Campinha-Bacote, PhD, APRN, presented: "A Model for Addressing Cultural Competence in Healthcare Delivery." Through the use of experiential exercises and case studies, Dr. Campinha-Bacote discussed the clinical application of her model's constructs of cultural desire, cultural awareness, cultural knowledge, cultural skill and cultural encounters. The workshop was attended by over 100 healthcare workers, including faculty, students and nursing staff from both the acute care and community practice areas. We left with a better understanding of how to be taking a more knowledgeable, culturally conscious approach for positively impacting the quality of healthcare services for all patients.

News from STTI

Jennifer Martin, President-elect of Tau Phi recently attended the 39th biennial convention, which was themed Vision to Action: Global Health Through Collaboration. During the convention, nurses from 33 countries gave 850 original presentations describing research and projects designed to improve worldwide health care by advancing nursing science, practice, education, administration and policy development. Held in Baltimore, MD, this event provided Jennifer with 6 days of non-stop Sigma lore and information.

The new president of Sigma Theta Tau is Carol Huston, MSN, MPA, DPA

Carol Huston is the President-Elect of the Honor Society of Nursing, Sigma Theta Tau International (STTI). She was elected in 2005 to serve two years as President-Elect (2005-2007) and two years as President (2007-2009).

Dr. Huston has been a professor at California State University, Chico (CSUC) School of Nursing since 1982. She teaches leadership, management, professional issues, and health systems to undergraduate and graduate students. Huston is co-developer of the Marquis-Huston Model for Teaching Critical Thinking, which has been recognized internationally by nurse scholars.

Huston is also the co-author or author of four books, and has published more than 70 articles in leading professional journals and serves on the editorial board for the Journal of Nursing Scholarship. She also serves as a manuscript reviewer for multiple other journals.

Her research interests include critical thinking, mentoring, outcomes measurement, quality health care, empowerment of the nursing profession, and professional issues. In November 2007, she will be inducted as a Fellow into the American Academy of Nursing.

From the international travelers: October 20-28, 2007- 3 members of Sigma Theta Tau, Tau Phi chapter, Lisa Allison- Jones, Becky Clark, and Linda Rickabaugh were part of an adventure. This adventure was a medical mission trip to the mountains of Honduras through Thrasher Memorial United Methodist Church and the Friends of Barnabas Foundation. The team consisted of a total of 14- medical and non-medical members, joined by an Honduran physician and interpreters in Honduras. Objectives of the mission were to provide holistic health care & education, parasite eradication and eye care- screening and glasses as needed to persons in mountain villages of Western Honduras- with a particular focus on the children. Referrals are also made for follow-up care for surgical needs and long term care of chronic problems.

Members were able to use their (limited) Spanish skills and health assessment skills during four days of medical clinics. Approximately 1200 people were served. Travel by bus over tortuous dirt roads to get to the villages is hard to describe- but probably not recommended for those with faint hearts or fear of heights! One day, weather did not permit travel to the village because of a heavy rain the night before with downed power lines and loss of electricity and water. Team members were able to visit a nearby private hospital in Siguatepeque that day, however, which was extremely rewarding!

If you asked each of us what was the highlight of this trip, you might get three different answers- but it was very memorable for all. As a matter of fact- all plan to go again in 2008 and hope to take some JCHS student nurses along. A special thank you to all who generously contributed money for medications and equipment.
